Why do Black Americans vote for the Democratic Party?

The Democratic Party was responsible for the Jim Crow Laws, segregated schools, restaurants and stores.

There was even an effort to limit the growth of the Black population.

Planned Parenthood traces its roots back to a nurse named Margaret Sanger. On October 16, 1916, Sanger — together with her sister Ethel Byrne and activist Fania Mindell — opened the country's first birth control clinic in Brownsville, Brooklyn.

Sanger believed in eugenics, an inherently racist and ablest ideology that labeled certain people unfit to have children. Eugenics is the theory that society can be improved through planned breeding for "desirable traits" like intelligence and industriousness. In the early 20th century, eugenic ideas were popular among highly educated, privileged, and mostly white Americans. Margaret Sanger pronounced her belief in and alignment with the eugenics movement many times in her writings, especially in the scientific journal Birth Control Review.

Sanger was so intent on her mission to advocate for birth control that she chose to align herself with ideas and organizations that were ablest and white supremacist. In 1926, she spoke to the women's auxiliary of the Ku Klux Klan (KKK) at a rally in New Jersey to promote birth control methods. Sanger endorsed the 1927 Buck v. Bell decision, in which the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that states could forcibly sterilize people deemed "unfit" without their consent and sometimes without their knowledge. **Today the Democratic Party is in full support of Planned Parenthood.**

Lyndon Baines Johnson, a Democrat, the 36th president of the United States from 1963 to 1969 ushered in the Great Society, doing more damage to the black community than any president since.

The Great Society is considered one of the most extensive social reform plans in modern history. It was intended to benefit the minorities and the poor. In fact it destroyed the family structure and made black communities dependent on government for handouts.

In an interview with underage females, by a social worker charged with visiting welfare family homes, the girls could not wait until they were of age to get pregnant so they could get their own welfare check.

In 1965, 24 percent of black infants were born to single mothers.

As of 2015, 77.3 percent of black Americans have non-marital births.

At all ages, black Americans display lower marriage rates than do other racial and ethnic groups.

The Democratic Party is against school choice, trapping intercity black children in failing schools developing uneducated voters susceptible to manipulation and propaganda. Uneducated voters are less likely to question existing power structures or challenge the policies implemented by the ruling Democratic Party.

During the Reconstruction era in the United States (1865-1877), carpetbaggers were a term used to describe Northern politicians, businessmen, and adventurers who traveled to the Southern states after the Civil War. Some carpetbaggers sought economic opportunities in the South, engaging in exploitative practices, used Black Southerners to gain control of the region, just as today the Democratic Party is using the black leadership to remain in power and control.
